



## Instructions for Poekie Coat with Hood\*

(Time to complete: about one hour)

### Materials needed:

- Paper for your printer
- Ruler
- Scissors
- Fabric
- Marker or pen for tracing
- Pin
- Needle
- Thread
- Two Buttons

### How to make it:

For an experienced Poekie maker this is easy. After printing and cutting the pattern,<sup>\*2</sup> just follow the usual steps:  
• Place the Back pattern on an edge on the wrong side of your fabric,<sup>\*3</sup> following the arrow for the stretchy direction.<sup>\*4</sup>

- Trace around the pattern.
- Cut ON the lines you traced.
- Place, trace and cut the Front pattern and the Hood pattern twice, one time with an X, and one time with an O.
- Trace and cut the Collar pattern.
- With the right sides together (pen-marks on the outside), place and pin one front piece to the back piece, making sure that shoulder-seam, armhole and side seam match up.
- Get a needle and thread<sup>\*5</sup> and tie a knot at the end.<sup>\*7</sup>
- Sew back-stitch<sup>\*6</sup> along one of the striped lines as marked on the pattern.
- Tie a knot when you get to the end of the line.
- Cut the thread and sew the other seam that is marked with the striped line in the same way.
- Repeat the placing, pinning and sewing with the second front piece (this piece is 'mirrored' from the first piece).
- Turn your Poekie's coat inside out.
- With the right sides together place and pin the two hood pieces.
- Get a new thread, and back-stitch the two pieces from #1 to #2 as marked on the pattern.
- Cut the thread and turn the hood right side out.
- Tie another knot at the end of the thread and keep it ready.
- Place the seam you just sewed, at #2, in the middle of the small curve of the coat, and match up the edge of the hood with the curve of the coat until you come to a corner of the hood, almost, but not completely, to the front corner of the coat.
- Back-stitch the edge of the hood onto the curve of the coat until you come to the other corner of the hood.
- Tie a knot and cut the thread.
- Fit the coat on your Poekie, if it looks good, take the coat off and sew two buttons<sup>\*8</sup> on one of the front pieces, as marked on the pattern.
- Put the coat on your Poekie again, so that it fits perfectly.
- The two front pieces will overlap a little bit. Pull them nice and snug with the button underneath. Take a marker and mark the spot where the buttons touch the top fabric. Cut tiny, eentsy weentsy holes.
- Button up the coat and you are done!
- Finally, take your Poekie out in the world to show off his or her new clothes.

I can't wait to see what you've made at home and let me know if any part of these instructions is confusing!




